Overall Teacher Judgements - Mid-Year Update:

I've recently reviewed the data from our mid-year reports. One clear trend we've noticed is a **drop in** writing achievement, followed closely by mathematics. While this may seem concerning at first glance, it is **not unexpected** — and I want to explain why.

As a school, we are navigating a period of **significant curriculum change**.

This includes:

- A shift to Te Mātaiaho | The refreshed New Zealand Curriculum
- The introduction of structured literacy across all levels
- The transition to new assessment tools and expectations

This kind of transformation takes time, and it's important to remember that **our kaiako are working incredibly hard** to adapt their teaching and assessment practices. I want to assure you:

Your children are learning deeply and making great progress.

What does this data tell us?

The majority of students are achieving at or above expected levels in reading (75%) and mathematics (72%), while writing sits lower at 60%. Writing also has the highest proportion of students below or well below (40%), compared to 25% in reading and 28% in maths. This suggests writing is the key area of concern across the school and will require continued focus and support.

Why are our results like this?

Writing: The way we now measure progress has changed. As a result, some students who were previously considered "at" the expected level may now appear to be "below" the new curriculum phase expectations. It simply reflects a shift in the **benchmarks**, with a stronger focus on core skills such as spelling, sentence structure, and vocabulary knowledge.

Mathematics: The new curriculum places more emphasis on number knowledge, reasoning, and mathematical thinking. Children are being introduced to more advanced number concepts earlier than before — for example, ideas previously taught in Years 4–5 are now appearing across all levels. Some learners may seem to be "slipping" based on the new judgements, but again, this reflects a **change in how we assess**, not a loss in learning.

Where to from here?

Despite the challenges, I am fully confident in the direction we are taking. This has been a year of huge professional growth for both teachers and learners. The shift to a refreshed curriculum is bold, but necessary — and we're proud to be leaning into it together. Thank you for your continued support. Let's keep going, with courage and unity — the Holy Cross WAY.

Health and Sexuality Education Consultation

As part of our responsibility under the New Zealand Curriculum, schools are required to consult with parents and the wider community every two years on how Health and Sexuality Education is delivered. For Catholic primary schools, this process ensures our programmes are not only aligned with curriculum expectations but are also firmly rooted in the values, beliefs, and teachings of the Catholic faith.

At Holy Cross, our approach is guided by the document "Wonderfully Made in the Image of God: A Catholic Approach to Relationships and Sexuality Education for Catholic Schools in Aotearoa New Zealand".

This resource reminds us that every child is created in the image and likeness of God, and that <u>Relationships</u> and <u>Sexuality Education must:</u>

- Uphold the dignity of the human person
- Support holistic wellbeing
- Reflect our commitment to Christ-centred formation

Through this consultation, we aim to:

- Inform parents and whānau about what we teach and why
- Listen to community perspectives and values
- Work together to ensure our programme is ageappropriate, culturally responsive, and consistent with our Catholic character

What's Next?

On the next page, you'll find a pamphlet that outlines what Health and Sexuality Education looks like at Holy Cross School. Please take a few moments to read it and reflect on what matters most to you as we walk this journey together with your tamariki.

We will be consulting with Year 4–8 families in Week 5, taking time to gather your thoughts and suggestions. We'll then use your feedback to co-design a programme that truly reflects the values, needs, and character of our kura.

- Explore basic reproduction with a focus on the sacredness of life.
- Understand personal dignity and selfworth as children of God.

How Parents Can Help:

- Answer questions about puberty with honesty and clarity.
- Reinforce the idea that body changes are natural and part of God's design.
- Use prayer and reflection to talk about values and decision-making.
- Keep an open door for difficult or "awkward" conversations.

Key Learnings:


- Learn more deeply about sexuality, reproduction, and fertility.
- Understand God's plan for love, relationships, and the sacredness of marriage.
- Explore influence of media, peer pressure, and cultural messages.
- Develop skills for healthy, respectful relationships and responsible choices.

How Parents Can Help:

- Talk about Catholic values and what love really means (faithful, free, fruitful).
- Set healthy boundaries around devices and media—talk about what's seen online.
- Model respect in your relationships
 —teens notice everything.
- Encourage self-respect, prayerful discernment, and open questions.





Years 1–2: Being Created in God's Image

Key Learnings:

- Recognise that we are all created uniquely and loved by God.
- Identify basic body parts using correct names.
- Begin to understand privacy, safety, and boundaries.
- Value family and friendships as part of God's plan.

How Parents Can Help:

- Use positive affirmations: "God made you wonderful!"
- Teach boundaries through routines (e.g. asking permission to hug).
- Help them name emotions and talk about friends and feelings.
- Share bedtime stories or prayers that affirm their dignity.

Themes Reinforced Across All Levels

Theme	Emphasis	
Human Dignity	Each person is made in God's image and is worthy of love and respect.	
Body as Sacred	Our bodies are temples of the Holy Spirit; we honour God with our bodies.	
Safety & Consent	Children are taught bodily autonomy and to speak up if something is wrong.	
Faith and Formation	Catholic values shape understanding of love, identity, and relationships.	
Relationships	Emphasis on love, kindness, inclusion, and God-centred relationships.

Our topics this term will be science based, with many hands-on experiences for the children. We will be covering magnets and simple machines, with Room 7 also looking at the water cycle. Our reading and writing times will incorporate books and stories around these, as well as our structured literacy focus.

Maths: our structured maths continues, using the Numicon resources. We will also be covering measurement (length, mass and volume).

Mia, Simone and Virginia will be attending a Numicon PD hands-on workshop in August on one of our release days, and it will be exciting to bring back our new learning into the classrooms.

RE: In our RE lessons we will be focussing on Church:

- Developing an understanding that I am part of God's family, and what I do and how I behave towards others, is important.
- Recognising that the Church has rituals, symbols and holy things, and I can learn what to do and say to be part of them.

We will also celebrate the feast of The Assumption of Mary on the 15th of August.

PE: This term we will be focussing on running - short, medium and longer distance.

Kura Ahurea: The Hongi - The story of Hongi focuses on another trick of Tane's - breathing life into a woman. It is a story of life and connection.

As always, if you have any questions, please see your child's teacher. We all look forward to teaching your children again this term!



Middle Syndicate

Room 8, Room 3 & Room 5

Term 3 is a busy time for learning- our tamariki often 'take off' and seem to have an extra burst of motivation and enthusiasm as the learning they have been doing starts to consolidate.

Our focus for the term is based around our **Religious Education** theme which is 'Being Church'. As our local church, Holy Cross is now closed due to being a safety risk, many of our tamariki have not been into a Catholic Church in recent times. We are hoping to walk to St Anthony's Church in Seatoun to have the opportunity to explore what a church looks like and feels like and also to join with the whole school and visit Sacred Heart Cathedral in the city towards the end of the term.

In other subject areas we are covering

Maths- Fractions (all), Decimals (Year 4 above) and Percentages (Year 5 and 6). Concepts around decimals and percentages will be new to our tamariki as the revised curriculum now has these being taught at a lower year level. Geometry- Shapes and spatial reasoning. Probability and Statistics.

We will be sending home material this week on how you can support your tamariki as they learn basic facts- we have assessed what facts they know and will be setting goals around the facts they need to learn. We are very grateful for families to support us here. When basic facts are remembered and can be recalled automatically, then there is more brain space to work on the complexities in maths.





Literacy- Our reading and writing will be linked. Room 8 and 3 are covering Narrative writing, Poetry and persuasive writing.

Room 5 are focusing on aspects of how we create texts- sentence structure, paragraphs, expanding ideas and punctuation.

All classes continue to work on explicit letter sounds and morphology in spelling and improving handwriting speed and presentation.

Other activities-

Garden to Table- we will continue to explore the garden and the kitchen as we cook up a storm and prepare for spring.

Art- tamariki are preparing art for Grandparents day to be displayed in the hall and in classes.

Kapa Haka- Some of our tamariki have been chosen to take part in the Cultural Celebration at St Patrick's Wellington on Tuesday 12th August. Those not involved will be learning a new Purakau (story) in Kura Ahurea about hongi.

PE- Large Ball skills are the focus this term with the Eastern Zone's netball competition and winter sports in full swing after school

Senior Syndicate – Term 3 Learning Overview: **Rūma Tahi & Rūma Rua**

This term, we welcome **Ben Gittos**, who is covering Mrs Stefanidis' duties in Rūma Tahi and Rua.

Fundraising for Camp 2026 is going well—our Read-a-thon finishes in Week 6, and a mid-winter raffle is coming soon. Thanks to your support with the sausage sizzle, bake sale, and sponsorship, we've already reduced the camp cost by around \$20 per student.

In **Religious Education**, we're exploring Whakapapa – Our Story, Being Church, and Oho Ake – Inspired, with a focus on Mary, the Saints, the Holy Spirit, and Catholic Social Teaching. Emotional learning continues through the Zones of Regulation programme.

Our **literacy** programme includes persuasive writing, personal narratives, and group discussions that build respectful communication. In reading, students are developing critical thinking through School Journals, novel studies, and short films. Spelling follows The Code programme.

In **maths**, our focus includes positive and negative numbers, probability, algebra, measurement, and geometry.

Year 7-8 students attend **Technology at Mt Cook** School on Tuesdays. **Performing arts** include kapa haka and singing, and our Ko Wai Au? te reo Māori unit helps students talk about themselves and their whānau.

Swimming continues every Wednesday, alongside netball, movement, and Māori games like Tapa Wae and Kī-o-Rahi.

Leadership opportunities include tuakana-teina roles, patrol duty, and peer support through Tuakana Āwhina. Ethel and Evelyn

- 3. Once you reach your school, select it with the tick on the righthand side. You can select as many schools as required.
- 4. Tap the 'select schools' button in the top right corner.
- 5. Tap the big orange choose button. This will load your school and bring you to the settings page.
- Subscribe to the groups that are relevant to you, then click the 'go back' button on your phone, which will bring you to the main screen of your schools app.
- 7. Use the circular arrow button at the top of the main screen to toggle between your chosen schools.
