Principal's message

One of the tasks a school has is to produce a Strategic and Annual plan which outlines the direction and focus a school can take. At our last Board of Trustees meeting, our Annual Plan for 2023 was accepted and from here we have published this on our website so all can view. You will find it here: Annual and Strategic Plan 2023

Our Strategic Plan dates back to 2019 and will be redeveloped this year. Strategic plans usually have a three year cycle which has been disrupted somewhat by COVID and new developments in our Education system. This is a task undertaken by the Board of Trustees who will be seeking input from whānau, community and iwi members later in the year. An ideal strategic plan captures the voice of the many people who are invested in seeing our tamariki grow and develop. It also reflects the needs and priorities of our community.

Our annual plan is developed by the Principal. This year's annual plan has had the input of the wider teaching team, our Senior Leadership Team of Lucy and Tala, along with Nik (our Director of Religious Studies- DRS) and Ethel who has influence in maths and in developing and supporting our focus on Te Ao Māori. We have identified work streams where we have goals and aspirations we would like to achieve. Here is a short summary of each.

Strengthening Plan for Holy Cross Special Character

Understanding the structure and themes of the new Catholic curriculum (To Tātou Whakapono) and beginning to use this structure to guide our planning and delivery of this curriculum is our main focus here - work being led by Nik Solia (our DRS)

Strengthening Plan Te Ao Māori

Building on our knowledge and understanding of local iwi tikanga and purakau (stories and histories) through our Kura Ahurea program which we have invested in for three years now

continues to be our focus. Working with Kim Nikora, from the Māori Achievement Challenge who is supporting us as we are on the journey of living out our commitment to Te Tiriti. Ethel Renata is helping support this mahi. Links can be made in this area with the work of the Catholic Schools Kahui Ako- a collective of 13 Catholic schools in the city.

Improvement Plan Enrichment Through the Arts

We are blessed to have Frankie Leota working with us this year through the Ministry of Education project Creatives in Schools. Frankie has the job of weaving the ideas, talents and abilities of our wonderful tamariki as we create a production that reflects the idea of Journey at Holy Cross School.


Strengthening Plan for Literacy

Continuing to take up the new structured literacy approach to teaching reading and writing with training happening now at a Year 2 (Room 7) level is our focus. Boosting early literacy skills through the Early Literacy Support program through Reading Recovery for tamariki who need that extra early support in their literacy. We have targets set in reading and writing for students who need support to achieve at the expected level of the curriculum.

Strengthening Plan for Developing Cultural Capability Through a Maths Lens.

We have a Ministry of Education funded Professional Development opportunity this year working with Louise Miller from Cognition Education. Staff are exploring ways our teaching can support tamariki as they begin to set their own goals for learning and use math strategies that encourage discussion, exploration and deeper thinking. We also have targets set in maths for students needing support to reach expected outcomes of the curriculum.

Catholic character



May is the month of Mary - this beautiful painting Ko Hāta Maria, te Matua Wahine o te Atua by Damien Walker is on display at Saint Mary of the Angels in Wellington City. There is a wonderful blend of culture in this painting that represents major cultural influences in New Zealand.

Last Friday Holy Cross School had a beautiful time of celebrating who we are in all our diverse cultures through our Powhiri process. We welcomed 3 new tamariki and four staff members to our school. Our senior students/rangatahi led us beautifully into this atmosphere of welcome, reflecting the character of Mary and showing our Holy Cross Value of 'Yes'. 6 of our young girls/kotiro carried the role of Kaikaranga for the first time- trained and supported to do so by Ethel.

We have a group of boys who are now able to lead the whaikorero- the speeches of welcome from the tangata whenua of Holy Cross School and the responses on behalf of the manuhiri or visitors. Again Tala has trained these young men to speak with confidence and have an understanding of the words said.

Every time we have powhiri, confidence levels increase as our young people/rangatahi stand in this space and say 'yes' to being a leader and representing our school. The atmosphere of respect and welcome that these young rangatahi set allows for our visitors to share something of themselves and their whanau with us- it is a beautiful time of welcome. We gain a special glimpse into the lives and cultures of those people joining us. I invite you to come join us for our next Powhiri- week 3 term 3 (Friday 4th August). Come slip into the seats at the back on the side of our school and experience our students saying 'yes' to leadership and blessing us. It's a special time.

Special Newsletter - Cardinal John Dew

Cardinal John Dew retires as Catholic Archbishop of Wellington

Cardinal John Dew, the Catholic Archbishop of Wellington since 2005, has retired on reaching his 75th birthday.

Pope Francis has accepted Cardinal John's formal resignation as Archbishop of Wellington and made the announcement at Noon in Rome on 5 May – 10pm in New Zealand – coinciding with Cardinal John's birthday.

Coadjutor Archbishop Paul Martin SM succeeds Cardinal John as Archbishop of Wellington.

Cardinal John remains as Apostolic Administrator of the Diocese of Palmerston North and continues with his various Vatican roles, including membership of the College of Cardinals, able to take part in papal elections until aged 80.

The Catholic Church's 1983 Code of Canon Law states that archdiocesan and diocesan bishops (including cardinals) are required to submit their resignation to the pope on reaching the age of 75 years.

Coincidentally, Cardinal John and Archbishop Paul share birthdays – both were born on 5 May.

Archbishop Paul says Cardinal John has served Wellington and the Church with

"We wish Cardinal John well in his retirement, which I am sure will be an active one," said Archibishop Paul. "He has guided the Archdiocese of Wellington through many challenges and major changes, always with a very pastoral approach. He has also had many demanding national roles in the Church, and we will miss him".

Archbishop Paul was the Bishop of Christchurch from December 2017 until 1 January 2021 when he was appointed Coadjutor Archbishop of Wellington, an appointment that meant he would succeed Cardinal John on the latter's retirement

Cardinal John was appointed Auxiliary Bishop of Wellington in May 1995, then as Caadjutor Archbishop in May 2004. He succeeded Cardinal Thomas Williams as Archbishop of Wellington in March 2005. Pope Francis appointed him as a Cardinal in February 2015.

John Atcherley Dew was born in Waipawa in Central Hawke's Bay on 5 May 1948. He attended St Joseph's Primary School in Waipukurau and St Joseph's College in Masterton. He prepared for the priesthood at Holy Name Seminary in Christchurch

and Holy Cross Seminary, Mosgiel, and was ordained in May 1976. Before being appointed Auxiliary Bishop of Wellington, he served for five years in youth ministry, for four years as Director of First-Year Formation at Holy Cross Seminary, and ministered in parishes of the Archdiocese of Wellington and in the Cook Islands. Among his national and regional roles, he has been President and Secretary of the New Zealand Catholic Bishops Conference, and served for four years as President of the Federation of Catholic Bishops Conferences of Oceania. He has also been the Bishop of the Military Ordinariate for New Zealand since he became Archbishop of Wellington.

Cardinal John continues with his Holy See appointments to the Congregation for Evangelisation of Peoples, the Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments, and the Dicastery for Promoting Christian Unity, and membership of the College of Cardinals.

Cardinal John thanked the priests and people of Wellington for their support during his years as Archbishop.

"I have always enjoyed and felt most at home in the parishes and schools of the Archdiocese, among the many committed people who are part of the Church in the Archdiocese." he said. "I look forward to being able to do this on a more informal basis in the future.

"I am sure Archbishop Paul will receive the same support as I have had. As I said when he was appointed Coadjutor Archbishop, I am confident that he will lead the Archdiocese into the future with energy and vision."

Archbishop Paul Martin will be formally installed as Archbishop of Wellington on Saturday 17 June at St Teresa's Pro-Cathedral.

It has been six weeks since my last newsletter, that has been because of the time I needed to recuperate from spinal surgery. Thanks be to God I have made a good recovery. Thank you for your prayerful support.

This newsletter is also my last. Yesterday Pope Francis accepted my resignation as Archbishop of Wellington. Canon law requires that bishops offer their resignation to the Holy Father when they reach 75 years of age, and today I reached that age.

It is with sadness that I say goodbye, and an enormous THANK YOU to you all. I will still be about and look forward to being involved in the life of the Archdiocese in other ways. Archbishop Paul Martin has now succeeded me and has become the 8th Archbishop of Wellington. I wish Paul every blessing and ask that you support him in the same way as you have supported me.

Many years ago, when the New Zealand Bishops met Pope St John Paul II during an ad limina visit to Rome, one of our bishops said to him, "Holy Father, I would not have your job for all the money in the world." The Pope looked up and said, "It is a privilege". I can honestly say that this has been a privilege for me. There have been many challenges and some difficulties and like Jesus at times I have also had to be resolute about "taking the road to Jerusalem" (Luke 9:51). I have always loved this part of Luke's Gospel which follows straight after the experience of Jesus on the Mount of Transfiguration. It is a reminder that when we have encountered Jesus in prayer we can be resolute in dealing with challenges and difficulties.

Never forget that we are all the chosen and beloved daughters and sons of God. We are privileged to walk together in our Church, our family of faith.

Thank you for your prayers, love and support. Your constant support, your commitment to the Church, your willingness to walk the way of Jesus, tell the truth of Jesus and live the life of Jesus have been inspiring.

Every time you go to Mass and hear Archbishop Paul's name in the Eucharistic Prayer, please make that a sincere prayer for him. Paul will be installed as Archbishop of Wellington on Saturday 17th June at St Teresa's Pro-Cathedral; he will take the Shepherd's crook from me and walk with you as you accompany one another in prayer and mutual support.

Thank you for everything, please keep me in prayer and I will you.

Ikura | Manaakitia te whare tangata

We are delighted to share with you that Holy Cross School are participating in the Ikura | Manaakitia te whare tangata - period products in schools initiative.

Ikura (periods) are a fact of life for half the population. Through this initiative, the Ministry of Education is providing period products (pads and tampons) to support students in managing their ikura.

Students can miss out on learning, sporting and cultural activities, and feel embarrassed and ashamed if they can't access products to manage their periods. This negatively impacts their achievement and wellbeing.

The Ikura | Manaakitia te whare tangata initiative is available to all state and state-integrated schools and kura in New Zealand. Research shows that the average age young people start menstruating is decreasing. As a result, access to period products is needed in primary and intermediate as well as secondary schools.

We now have product available for students to use at school and to take home. Students have been advised how they can access these products in a safe and discreet way.

We hope that providing access to period products will help to reduce barriers to accessing education.

Chef of the Day Anaya (Year 4, Room 3)

Today my Garden to Table group called the Green Beans were in the kitchen. The recipe we made was *Cheesy Kale Chips*. This is a healthy snack recipe that most people can eat because it is a vegan dish. The first thing we did was to chop and de-stem the kale. We also used a new green vegetable from our school garden called magenta spreen. Magenta spreen has a pretty pink colour. We grated up sunflower seeds and cashew nuts, which we added to the veggies. We put the ingredients on a baking tray and drizzled them with olive oil before baking them in the oven. Today our teacher, Ben, reminded us about how to use knives safely when we are cooking. We are all wanting to get a knife licence.





Garden of the Day Alex (Year 4, Room 3)

Today my Garden to Table group (The Cool Cucumbers) learned all about how soil is formed in nature. First we set up a soil experiment. Olivia showed us a glass jar with soil in it and then we added water to this to see what would happen. We have left the jar of soil and water on the Room 3 discovery table. We are going to check it throughout the week to see what will happen. We also identified different plants in the school garden that we can eat including one called kale and another called magenta spreen.


